

Workforce Development and Career Education at College of Marin

By 2030, California will experience a shortfall of nearly 1.8 million workers. Nearly 70% of this workforce gap will be in higher skill positions that offer above average wages and require a post-secondary degree. In Marin County, this gap is compounded by retirements and by residents moving out of the region.

Recent legislation has shifted K-12 focus areas toward prioritizing career education, comprehensive educational pathways, and deeper integration of both college and career readiness. However, high schools are unable to meet the tremendous gap in preparing students to enter the workforce when they graduate. And, although, around 76% of the students in Marin County who graduate from a comprehensive high school attend some form of post-secondary education, nearly 24% (or approximately 542 students) disconnect from post-secondary education entirely.

The State has budgeted of over \$320 million to expand pathway-focused workforce development strategies. This means more resources and opportunities to better support students, with specific attention to those disconnected and displaced from education and workforce participation.

Join us as we share College of Marin's efforts to advance meaningful career education across the county, and hear about the ways in which the college works to advance equity through innovative career education and workforce development partnerships, programs, dual enrollment, and comprehensive educational pathways leading to in-demand jobs in industries like healthcare, construction, technology, and more.



VOTER SERVICE UPDATE

A Shoutout to all the Members who Helped

On September 1st, we collaborated with Dominican University on a lecture by Alison Howard, Chair of the Division of Public Affairs. She presented "To Recall or not to Recall," an excellent lecture on the history of the recall process and how it works.

Our Voter Service team leaders are looking ahead to 2022 and are planning for voter education and outreach related to the June 7 Statewide Primary Election and November 8 Statewide General Election. We will be sharing new opportunities for our members to participate in voter education and outreach including leadership roles.

We are looking forward to the pandemic easing and allowing us to do more work in person.

ELECTIONS

On September 14, California had its first gubernatorial recall election in 20 years. An extremely short timeline presented new challenges for educating voters in Marin County.

By gathering information from our Marin County Elections Dept., the Secretary of State, our state League (LWVCEF) and other trusted sources, we put together a voter guide and other helpful resources. To maximize our impact, we asked our membership (you) and our community allies and partners to share with their networks. We also utilized social media and our website.

The Recall Election was scheduled on September 14, but most voters returned their vote by mail ballots early. Marin County's turnout was the highest in the state at 76.57%.

CANDIDATE FORUM

The November 2 Special Election has one contest – a vacated Tiburon Town Council seat. November 2 is the last day to vote, with all registered voters receiving a ballot in the mail. Voter education was online via social media and our website.

Becky Bingea worked to make sure our county election information is accurately posted on Voter's Edge for the Recall and November 2 Special Election.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Under the terms of a contract with the County Elections Department, the League is charged with making sure certain sites are stocked with registration forms. These sites include post offices, city halls, libraries, and some community centers in all cities and localities in Marin County. We also contact Assisted Living facilities to provide forms as requested.

California Registration forms were revised this year due to the passage of Prop. 17 which now grants state parolees the right to vote. As a result, all old registration forms were out of compliance and had to be destroyed and replaced with new forms. Our steady group of volunteers who work on the County contract successfully completed this task.

SHOULD WE USE OPEN SPACE TO HELP SOLVE THE HOUSING CRISIS?

Nearly 25 years ago, the U.S. Navy transferred more than 400 acres on Point Molate to the City of Richmond. People have been fighting over them ever since. A core point of contention is whether or not to build housing on part of this headland, which includes one of the few undeveloped shorelines in the East Bay. Where the city envisions a mix of housing, a shoreline park, and hillside trails, opponents envision a regional park all the way from the sandy beach to the 400-foot bluffs. **Read More**



Take Action: Tell President Biden to Champion Federal Voting Rights Reforms

The Biden-Harris Administration rose into office only after the historic 2020 election achieved record-shattering voter participation and necessary expansions to voter access during a deadly pandemic. But now those very same expansive innovations and reforms for voting are under direct assault across the country. The nation is on the precipice of sliding back into an era of Jim Crow, a racial caste system that legitimized anti-blackness and thwarted multiculturalism. Yet the Biden-Harris administration has used few of the tools at its disposal to champion federal voting rights reforms.

Now is not the time to back down, but to surge forward. Federal voting rights protections cannot wait and are vital to saving the soul of our democracy. The League is calling for the White House to harness its substantial power and in-

fluence to lead the fight for voting rights reforms that will:

- Protect and enforce voting rights;
- Address the historical barriers to voting;
- Provide oversight on voting rights violations;
- Hold states and bad actors accountable; and
- Create a democracy that is representative of all Americans.

Your voice is powerful, now it's time to raise it up to the Oval Office. Call on the Biden-Harris White House to lead this fight to protect the freedom to vote.

November Committee Meeting Speaker


Thursday, November 11 at 10am (see p. 7)


